Master's Degree Program

The Graduate School of Sociology accepts those who have the following knowledge and skills, abilities of thinking, judgement, and expression, and proactive attitudes and deserve as the graduate school students according to the Diploma Policy and Curriculum Policy of the Graduate School from a wide range of people including adult members of society and international students:

- 1. To have sufficient basic knowledge and academic abilities necessary for becoming independent researchers, and/or to have sufficient basic knowledge and academic abilities necessary for professionals provided with advanced expertise.
- 2. To have a deep consciousness for problems of society and human beings, and to have enough concerns and willingness to research from wider perspectives.
- 3. To have willingness to contribute academically to society by solving the problems of society and human beings and creating new values.

Ph.D. Degree Program

The Graduate School of Sociology accepts those who have the following knowledge and skills, abilities of thinking, judgement, and expression, and proactive attitudes, and deserve as the graduate school students according to the Diploma Policy and Curriculum Policy of the Graduate School from a wide range of people including adult members of society and international students:

- 1. To have sufficient basic knowledge and academic abilities of expertise necessary for independent researchers in the future.
- 2. To have wider research concern, original consciousness for problems, and flexible intelligence necessary for conducting interdisciplinary research of social and human sciences.

○ Regarding the Course System for the Sociology Major (Master's Degree Program)

(1) Academic Career Course

⟨Course Outline⟩

The Academic Career Course is intended to cultivate academic expertise in sociology and is for aspiring researchers.

⟨Taking the Course and Earning Credits⟩

At least 30 credits must be earned, including Joint Seminars I a, I b, II a, II b, Seminars (or Project Exercises) A, B (4 credits for 2 subjects) and thesis instruction A, B (4 credits for 2 subjects).

⟨Completion Requirements⟩

Those who have completed at least two years in this course, earned the specified credits and passed their master's thesis defense and final examination will be conferred a master's degree (in sociology).

(2) Project Study Course

⟨Course Outline⟩

The Project Study Course is intended to cultivate practical sociology skills over a two-year Master's Degree period and is for those who aspire to contribute to the real world.

(Taking the Course and Earning Credits)

At least 30 credits must be earned, including Joint Seminars I a, I b, II a, II b, Seminars (or Project Exercises) A, B (4 credits for 2 subjects) and Project Study A, B (4 credits for 2 subjects).

⟨Completion Requirements⟩

Those who have completed at least 2 years in this course, earned the specified credits and passed the review of their research results for the specified project and passed their final examination will be conferred a master's degree (in sociology).

(3) Selecting a Course, Acceptance Criteria

① Select the desired course during Online Application.

This course selection cannot be changed after submitting your application.

② If you select the Academic Career Course, your candidacy will be considered for the Academic Career Course. If you are not accepted to the Academic Career Course, you will instead be considered for the Project Study Course.

You will be notified as to which course you have been accepted to in your acceptance letter.

③ If you select the Project Study Course, you will only be considered for the Project Study Course.

(4) Advancing to the Ph.D. Degree Program following Expected Completion of the Special Study Course

Those who continue on to the Sociology Major Ph.D. Degree Program are exempt from the specialized subject examination.

■ Becoming a Certified Professional Social Researcher

The Sociology Major course at the Graduate School of Sociology has been certified for training Certified Professional Social Researchers by the Japanese Association for Social Research from 2005.

Those who wish to take an examination for qualifying as a Certified Professional Social Researchers certified by the Japanese Association for Social Research must fulfill the following 4 conditions:

- 1) Have Certified Social Researcher qualifications
- 2) Have earned credits by taking the subjects corresponding to the standard curriculums H∼J of the Japanese Association for Social Research
- 3) Have written a master's thesis or other type of research paper using the results of a social survey (refer to the website of the Japanese Association for Society Research for details about the research range)
- 4) Have completed the Master's Degree Program

However, regarding 1), if you have not obtained a social researcher qualification, it is possible to acquire the qualifications of a social researcher and a professional social researcher at the same time by taking both the undergraduate subjects: Social Researcher Standard Curriculums A \sim F of the (E and F are optional) and the graduate subjects (corresponding to the Standard Curriculums H \sim J), it is possible to acquire the qualifications of a social researcher and a professional social researcher at the same time by taking the courses in parallel with the courses corresponding to.

As for 2), it is necessary to acquire credits for the "Social Research Training" (135 minutes \times 30 weeks), which is a lesson course established by the major, corresponding to the Standard Curriculums H \sim J.

Those who wish to acquire the qualifications should contact the Responsible person for Social Researcher at the Graduate School of Sociology (MABUCHI Ryogo, Faculty of Sociology Major) through the Social Survey Training Preparation Room (B201(A) on the 2nd floor of the 3rd Building) as soon as possible after enrolling in Kansai University.

Master's Degree Program: International Students Entrance Examination (October Examination and February Examination)

1. Qualification

Applicants who have obtained Level N1 (previously Level 1) on the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) or scored 240 points or higher (including the writing score) on Japanese as a Foreign Language in the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) which the valid period specified by the issuing institution of the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) includes the application start date for the Examination Month, and who shall satisfy one of the following (1)~(5):

(including applicants who are expected to satisfy one of the following (1) \sim (4) conditions before enrolling at the Graduate School)

- (1) Applicants who have completed a regular 16-year program of school education outside Japan (Note 1).
- (2) Applicants who have graduated from Japanese universities as international students.
- (3) Persons who have completed a 3-year program or a program of more than 3 years and have been awarded a degree by an overseas university or school (Note 2) which is recognized as being equivalent to a bachelor's degree.
 - (the 2016 ordinance of the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology, No. 19)
- (4) Applicants who have completed Specialized Course at Japanese special training schools after the designated date by the minister of MEXT[†] as international students. The training schools must satisfy the conditions designated by MEXT including that the length of term required for graduation be at least four years.
 - † MEXT; Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (5) Applicants who are recognized as having scholastic abilities equivalent or superior to the graduates of university through Pre-qualification Individual Screening for Entrance Examination of the Graduate School. (This requirement shall not apply to the foreigners who are recognized as having received Japanese regular school education program.)
 - Note 1: Those enrolled in the following schools are considered to be the same as application qualification (1), as long as the period is less than four years in total.
 - · Elementary school, junior high school, high school etc. based on Japanese school education law
 - · Foreign school in Japan
 - · Overseas educational facilities accredited or designated by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
 - Note 2: The university or the school shall be evaluated by an organization approved by a relevant official institution in the country for their education and research activities or recognized as so by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology.

3. Screening Method

The Graduate School will determine whether or not to admit applicants based on a comprehensive evaluation of document screening, written examination and oral examination.

For applicants to the Sociology Major Special Study Course, if you are not accepted for the Special Study Course, you will instead be considered for the Project Study Course.

4. The Pass/Fail Criteria

Pass/Fail is determined by the higher total score on the written and oral examinations, in descending order. If either the written or oral examination score does not meet the criteria, the applicant may fail in spite of the total score.

In order to examine and screen the necessary erudition to study in the Graduate School of Sociology, the number of successful applicants may not reach the enrollment capacity.

- (2) Applicants who have received a master's or professional degree from Japanese graduate schools as international students.
- (3) Applicants who have completed programs and received degrees equivalent to a master's degree from the United Nations University*.
 - *United Nations University; established by the resolution of the General Assembly of the United Nations on December 11, 1972, as stipulated in Article 1 Paragraph 2 of the Act on Special Measures incidental to Enforcement of the Agreement between the United Nations and Japan regarding the Headquarters of the United Nations University.
- (4) Applicants designated by the minister of MEXT[†]. (Bulletin No. 118 of 1989) † MEXT; Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (5) Applicants who are recognized as having degrees equivalent or superior to a master's degree by our graduate school and have reached the age of 24 (before enrolling at the Graduate School). This requirement shall not apply to the foreigners who are recognized as having received Japanese regular school education program.
